Classroom curriculum

Our curriculum is based on principals using an integrated inquiry approach, modeled after the Reggio Emilia Approach to children's learning. In this method, teachers teach our Florida learning standards in such a way that the standards are incorporated into topics children are interested in learning more about, or that teachers wish to bring to children's awareness. The curriculum areas that are integrated and explored include math, sciences, language arts, social studies, studio arts, music, gross and fine motor development, health and safety, character, and spiritual development. We believe young children want and need to express ideas and messages through different expressive ways such as working with clay, paint, drawing, sculpture, construction, music, movement, dance, and shadow play. Children begin to gain new skills with the use of these mediums. The children draw to learn. They revisit and revise their work moving them to new levels of awareness. We occasionally do worksheets for handwriting or math practice in our classroom, but most our work happens with manipulatives at school. We value original works of art rather than "copy-cat" types of craft projects, but we will do seasonal craft projects during the year.

Project Work

"A project is an in-depth investigation of a topic worth learning more about. The investigation is usually undertaken by a small group of children, sometimes by a whole class, and occasionally by an individual child. The key feature of a project is that it is a research effort deliberately focused on finding answers to questions about a topic posed by the children, teachers, or parents." -Lillian Katz

The length of the project may vary from a couple of weeks to several months. Project work is one of the ways we integrate the curriculum and state standards. Teachers plan for project study and guide children during project work, engaging them in the process of inquiry. Teachers also provide equipment and resources for the children to carry out their investigations.

Projects are often documented on documentation panels. Documentation panels are created to tell the story of the evolving project. With teacher narratives, photographs, conversations, and sample drawings the history of the project comes alive. Children, teachers, parents, and visitors can see first-hand what the children are learning and how the investigation is proceeding.

Learning Center Exploration

This time gives each child the opportunity to select activities independently, provide time for social interaction development and time for the teaching staff to gather information and insight on skills, interests and group dynamics. The teachers carefully arrange the classroom learning environment into distinct areas that reflect learning goals for children. Each area has a wide variety of high quality, open-ended materials, which promote critical thinking and creative skills. Teacher-led and child-led activities during choice time are carefully planned for and the children can move through them at their own pace during the week. They can also return to a favorite area or activity at another time. Teachers are stationed at different learning areas facilitating learning, leading a lesson there, or making observations of the children for assessments or documentation boards.

The Creative Process

Creativity is tied into career success and is therefore an important skill children will need to become successful in the future. Creativity includes being able to identify a problem or challenge and then working out the best approach for a solution. These skills are critical for life, both personally and professionally. We encourage children's creativity throughout the day. The following are the steps the teachers use to guide children's creative thinking:

PLAN: Children consider what they are going to do with the materials and how they are going to do it, to build a foundation for setting goals for themselves.

PLAY: Children use materials and make choices in ways that best suits their own personal curiosity and understanding and allows them to experience joy in creating meaning for themselves.

SHARE: Children recall/reflect with others about their experiences, reinforcing their learning in the process and formulating new questions to explore.

REVISIT: Children practice skills and replay their experiences over and over in many different ways and either confirm their understanding or adapt it based on new discoveries. As they explore, their understanding spirals; each new experience building on previous learning.

CONNECT: Children, with the guidance of highly trained teachers, create linkages among disciplines and areas of skill development.

Children involved in a project may work on drawings and paintings over many days and sometimes weeks. We focus more on the process rather than the product in the work the children do. Representational work, such as drawing, painting, sculpting, dramatizing, and building, become the tools the children use for their learning. As children draw, paint, sculpt and work with clay and wire, they begin to represent ideas and their understanding of the world. Children are encouraged to revisit their work, make additions and corrections to their drawings/paintings during the week, so you will find that your child's work may stay at school.

We ask for your support and understanding of this concept, so children do not feel pressured to produce a piece of artwork to take home every day. Our approach is not "a make and take home" practice. We work at slowing children down, helping them see details and how things change over time. In the process, children think creatively, make decisions and problem solve.

Classroom Wish Lists

As the year goes on, we may ask for specific things that will enrich our program. Teachers will send out requests for these items as new projects arise. Here are some examples that you can start off with:

- Scrap paper, stationary, and envelopes for the Communication Center.
- Gift Cards to Amazon, Michaels, Wal-Mart, Lakeshore, Jo-Ann's, Target, Dollar Tree, Ikea, etc. for odds and ends.
- The following are items we are always collecting to enhance our Loose Parts Center: Bottle caps, Corks, Wire Ribbon and yarn, Small tiles and/or stones, Buttons, Spools, Mason jars, Glass baby food jars, Cardboard tubes of all sizes, Blank CDs, Clear CD cases, Clear cassette cases, Keys, Broken jewelry and charms, Fabric scraps.

Separation Advice for Parents and Loved Ones

We know that you want to help your child get off to a good start in beginning school. Young children often experience difficulties with separation from their significant adults in new situations. They may cry or cling or behave differently than you are used to. Be assured that this is a typical, normal response and that these behaviors will slowly stop as children (and you) get more comfortable with the new situation. Some things you could do to support your child at this time are:

- Accept and respect your child's temporary unhappiness. Say things such as, "I know you're feeling sad when Dad leaves, but you will have a good time, and soon, you won't be so sad."
- Give yourselves enough time in the morning. Children often get anxious when rushed.
- Have pleasant conversation as you talk about some of the things your child enjoys about preschool.
- Remind your child of the predictability of your pickup arrangements, tying your return with an event, such as after naptime, and then arrive when you have said.
- Establish a pattern of what you will each do when you enter the classroom each day-for example, one hug and one kiss.
- Encourage your child to do as much as he or she can independently during the arrival process-for example, putting their lunchbox in their cubby.
- After you have said you will go, make your goodbye prompt, affectionate, and positive. Do not ever be tempted to sneak away while your child is occupied.
- Have your child's teacher step in to help with goodbyes when you give the sign that you are ready to go. Once you have left, avoid re-entering the classroom.
- Avoid the temptation to pressure your child not to cry or to offer bribes for "good behavior." Learning to cope with sadness is important for your child.
- Let the teacher know if there are routines or objects that bring comfort to your child. The teacher will be helped by this knowledge.
- Understand that the process of learning to trust new people naturally takes time. The teacher will be glad to discuss your concerns with you; together, you can make plans to meet your child's needs.

Lastly, keep in mind that studies show that parents' verbal explanations are the most important influence in how well children adapt to a new situation.

The Mangrove Welcome Letter

Dear Families,

Welcome to The Mangrove! We are delighted that your child is a part of our preschool family. We look forward to getting to know each child as we grow together this year. Our two lead teachers are Ms. Samantha and Ms. Kelli and two assistant teachers are Ms. Jasmine and Ms. Holly. Throughout this upcoming school year, children will be given ample opportunities to explore ideas and to express themselves creatively using a variety of objects and materials. They will be learning through experiences of touching, moving, listening, seeing, and hearing. This means that your child may not be bringing home crafts and projects every week. Your child will be an active constructor of knowledge in the classroom, and this will make learning meaningful and fun for them. We are so excited to embark on this journey of exploration with you and your child ②. Attached you will find some classroom expectations and other helpful information for The Mangrove. Please take the time to read through this packet so that we start off the year on the same page and help make the transition for the children a smooth one. Again, we would like to welcome you to The Mangrove and are looking forward to a great school year together! If you have any questions, please do not hesitate to contact us.

The Mangrove Classroom Expectations

- We ask that children be fed breakfast prior to coming into the classroom. This tends to become a distraction to those children that are not eating in the classroom and makes it harder to transition the children.
- Drop-offs will be done inside of the classroom between the hours of 7:30 and 8:45. After 8:45, you will be dropping off on the playground, if weather permits. We understand that drop-offs can be a very anxious and stressful time for you and your child. We recommend that drop-offs be short and consistent. You can prepare your child by saying that you will give them one hug/kiss or any other special routine you would like to create with your child. If your child is already anxious about drop-offs, a longer good-bye may escalate their anxiety. We have attached a handout on separation to help you if needed. If you have any questions or concerns about this, please do not hesitate to ask us and we can assist you in creating a routine that will work for the both of you.
- For sanitation and health reasons, we ask that if you send in water bottles with your child's lunch, please label with first and last name and place in the basket above their cubbies.
- Please refrain from bringing any toys from home. Lovies or comfort toys may be brought with the understanding that they need to be placed in the child's cubby upon arrival.
- Each child will be assigned a cubby at the beginning of the school year. We ask that lunch boxes be small enough to fit in your child's cubby. We will be storing change of clothes and diapers in the class bathrooms.
- Lunch will be from 11:35-12:15. The children will be ready to be picked up at 12:30 in the classroom. We encourage the use of a compartmentalized "bento box" style lunch container for your child's lunch. This will eliminate paper waste, food waste, and we will be able to close the lid and send the uneaten food back home to you so you can monitor how much food your child has eaten that day.
- We are a NUT FREE school. We have allergies in the classroom so please be sure to check all food labels. Please notify us if your child is not allowed to eat certain foods or snacks that we may provide at the school.
- No over the counter medications can be sent to school. Please do not add medication to your child's lunch drink, as they may not get the full dose. If your child needs medication to be administered at school, contact Ms. Krista for the appropriate form.
- Children who stay to nap can bring in a bag with a crib-size sheet, light blanket, and "lovie" which will be kept in the closet. Nap mats with pillows and blankets attached are also recommended (can be found on Amazon.com). These articles must go home on the last day you are here every week for laundering. *Pack and Play crib sheets do not fit our mats.
- Please understand that with this age group we focus on social, emotional, and motor skills. As part of the Reggio process, our lesson plans change with the interests of the children. The best way to know what we are doing is to look at our documentations around the classroom.

Potty Training Basics

When your child enters The Mangrove, we will discuss with you your plans for potty training. We must make sure all children are potty trained by the time they leave our classroom since The Reef does not have diapering facilities. Each child will be ready to start the process in his or her own time, but we are always working towards that goal! Potty training is most successful when the child is verbal enough to say they need to use the bathroom. Children are ready to potty train when their brain and bladder neurological connections are fully developed. As much as we may want a child to be potty trained, we cannot rush nature! We also place a tremendous emphasis on fine motor skills, developing confidence and autonomy in The Mangrove.

We encourage children that are ready - or even just beginning to show interest - to go in and sit on the potty several times during the morning. We also change the children standing up rather than on a changing table to help them build the skills to pull their own pants up and down. To help children build those skills and self-sufficiency, please dress your child in easy up/easy down pants for school, and avoid belts, onesies/rompers, and complicated buttons/snaps. We suggest you move from diapers to thick training pants, skipping pull-ups, so your child can feel when they are wet. Expect your child to have good days and bad days, but consistency is key. Also, not making a big deal of accidents will help your child be psychologically accepting of the process. Some people like to use "bribes", but we do not use that practice, unless a child shows that it is the only motivation for them. Playing your part at home to help potty train them during the days and times they are not at school will help the process as well. Please work closely with your child's teachers- and remember, it is especially important that YOU are ready to begin the process!

Our Reef community consists of four teachers who will serve as "Primary Caregivers" to a specific group of children. The Primary Caregiver is the teacher who will have primary responsibility for assessment and goal setting for your child. However, all the teachers in the room work as a team and you can approach any of them with general classroom questions. The Reef is a mixed age community that shares a single space consisting of six distinct learning centers: Language and Literacy, Science and Sensory Exploration, Logic and Mathematics, Construction Zone, Dramatic Play, and the Atelier. The Atelier is our studio that serves as a place of research, invention, and expression through artistic means. Our children will be challenged academically throughout the school year as they receive a well-rounded education through team teaching, flexible grouping, community time, and individualized instruction. These methods, along with a great deal of hands-on learning experiences, critical thinking and problem-solving activities, guest speakers, and FUN will ensure that the needs of every child in our program will be met. We also incorporate Christian values into our daily discussions and routines. Academic instruction will begin promptly at 8:30. Please help your child start the day successfully by arriving no later than 8:20 every day. Half day children should be picked up by 12:30, full day children should be picked up by 3:30, and Dolphins staying for VPK stay together from 12:30-3:30. Extended day is from 3:30-5:00.
